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Requiem Mass Said For Capt. J. R. Jansen

Requiem Mass was held for Capt. John R. Jansen, 27, at the Naval Station Chapel last Saturday with Father John W. Wishard, Catholic chaplain, officiating.

The young Air Force officer lost his life in the crash of his F-102 last Thursday, Sept. 15, while on a routine training flight. He was a member of the 57th Fighter Interceptor Squadron based here at Keflavik International Airport.

Assisting Father Wishard at the Mass were officers and men of the 57th FIS.

In his funeral eulogy, Father Wishard spoke of the subject of death and our commitment to it as a necessary boundary between life and the ultimate destiny of eternal life. The chaplain concluded his eulogy by saying, "our greatest tribute to Captain Jansen is not words of praise or useless tears, but to look upon him as a man who died in glory, and to emulate those virtues he lived so well."

The Mass was concluded by the playing of Taps by Marine Corporal John Puller.

Captain Jansen was born in Junction City, Kansas on Sept. 24, 1938, but called Aurora, Colo., his home. A graduate of the U. S. Air Force Academy in 1960, he married his wife Diane, on June 11 of that year. The late Captain had orders to report for duty at Oxnard AFB, Calif., and would have joined his wife late this month.

Mrs. Jansen is now residing at the home of her parents in Santa Fe, N. M.
